Background: CoC Membership Facilitators

The San Bernardino City and County Continuum of Care (CoC) is established to

The 2024 CoC Governance Charter calls for two Facilitators to lead the general membership (CoC Membership) in its responsibilities. These Facilitators are separate from the CoC Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH) Board Chair and Vice Chair. Individuals should not serve as both a CoC Facilitator and the Board Chair of Vice Chair. Other Board Members could be selected to serve as a CoC Facilitator.

Candidate Qualifications

- CoC Facilitators should have substantial working knowledge of the San Bernardino City and County CoC;
- Be dedicated to serving the best interest of the CoC as a whole;
- Be skilled in leading/facilitate large, diverse groups;
- Have a capacity to resolve conflict between members;
- Have working knowledge of the HUD CoC program;
- Have sufficient, flexible time to dedicate to the tasks of the CoC;
- Invested in working collaboratively with other leaders.

Duties and Responsibilities of the CoC Facilitators

The duties and responsibilities are described in Chapter 2 of the CoC Governance Charter as adopted in July 2024. In general, the CoC Facilitators could be considered Co-Chairs who manage the accomplishment of the tasks identified for the CoC Membership body. CoC Facilitators have leadership privileges parallel to the Board Chair and Vice Chair with respect to convening meetings, setting agendas, appointing Ad Hoc Committees.

Facilitators ensure the CoC Membership completes essential tasks such as calling full CoC Membership meetings at least three time each year, issuing a public notice inviting organizations and individuals to join the CoC; ensuring the Governance Charter is reviewed annually in consultation with the Collaborative Applicant and HMIS Lead agent, annually appointing an Ad Hoc Nominating Committee, ensuring an annual review and updates to Written Standards and Coordinated Entry policies by the groups identified to implement those tasks. A chart in the CoC Membership chapter in the Governance Charter provided detailed for the relationships between the CoC Membership, and other components of the CoC Structure.

How to Apply to Become a CoC Facilitator

Individuals wishing to apply for a position of CoC Facilitator will complete the same Application Packet as those applying for a position on the Board. **Applicants will clearly mark the top of their**

application as "CoC Facilitator" and in the application will identify the seat they desire as a CoC Facilitator.

DATE: October 7, 2024

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the Recommendations of the GRC for the CoC Renewals, DV Bonus application and CoC Bonus applications and the rating, ranking and tiering of the CoC application renewals, planning, and Bonus projects.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has made available approximately \$3,524,000,000 in funding for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 and FY 2025 CoC Continuum of Care Competition, including approximately \$52 million available for a Domestic Violence Bonus project and 10% of a CoC's Final Pro Rata Need (FPRN) for the CoC Bonus. In addition, HUD may add to this amount any available funds that have been carried over or recaptured from previous fiscal years.

The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2024 authorizes HUD to issue a single two-year Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for FYs 2024 and 2025. CoCs are only required to submit one CoC application that will be applicable to the FY 2024 and FY 2025 funds. Projects that are awarded FY 2024 funds may be eligible for award of FY 2025 funds using their FY 2024 application submission and are not required to apply for renewal for FY 2025 funds. Further details are pending release from HUD.

CoCs are expected to closely review information provided in each project application to ensure:

- All proposed program participants will be eligible for the program component type selected;
- 2. The information provided in the project application and proposed activities are eligible and consistent with program requirements in the Rule;
- 3. Each project narrative is fully responsive to the question being asked and that it meets all the criteria for that question as required by the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO);
- 4. The data provided in various parts of the project application are consistent; and
- 5. All required attachments:
 - a. Correspond to the list of attachments in e-snaps;

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- b. Must contain accurate and complete information; and
- c. Are dated between May 1, 2024 and October 30, 2024.

All project applications approved by the CoC are listed on the FY 2024 and FY 2025 CoC Priority Listing in rank order. CoC Planning is not competitively awarded and therefore not ranked. Higher ranked projects are assigned to Tier 1 and lower ranked projects are assigned to Tier 2 as described in sections I.B.3.h.(1) and (2) of the NOFO. This two-tiered approach for CoCs notifies HUD which projects are prioritized for funding based on local needs and gaps.

- Tier 1 is equal to 90 percent (\$13,370,896) of the CoC's ARD (\$14,527,189) as described in section I.B.2.b.(1) of the NOFO.
 - Project applications in Tier 1 will be conditionally selected from the highest scoring CoC to the lowest scoring CoC, provided the project applications pass both project eligibility and project quality threshold review, and if applicable, project renewal threshold.
 - Any type of new or renewal project application can be placed in Tier 1, except YHDP renewal or YHDP replacement, CoC planning, and if applicable, United Funding Agency (UFA) Costs projects as these projects are not ranked. If a DV Bonus project ranked in Tier 1 is selected with DV Bonus funds, the project will be removed from this tier and the projects below it will move up one rank position. However, if a new DV Bonus project is not selected with DV Bonus funds, the project will retain its ranked position (see section I.B.3.j of the NOFO). In the event insufficient funding is available to award all Tier 1 projects, Tier 1 will be reduced proportionately, which could result in some Tier 1 projects falling into Tier 2.
- Tier 2 is the difference between Tier 1 and the maximum amount of renewal, reallocation, and CoC Bonus funds that a CoC can apply for, but does not include YHDP renewal or YHDP replacement projects, CoC planning projects, and if applicable, UFA Costs projects, or projects selected with DV Bonus funds.
 - Project applications placed in Tier 2 will be assessed for project eligibility and project quality threshold requirements, and if applicable, project renewal threshold requirements, and funding will be determined using the CoC Application score as well as the factors listed in section I.B.3.h of the NOFO.
 - HUD will award a point value to each new and renewal project application that is in Tier 2 using a 100 point scale:
 - Up to 50 points in direct proportion to the score received on the CoC Application; e.g., if a CoC received 100 out of 200 points on the CoC Application, the project application would receive 25 out of 50 points for this criterion.
 - Up to 40 points for the CoC's ranking of the project application(s). To consider the CoCs ranking of projects, point values will be assigned directly related to the CoCs' ranking of project applications. The calculation of point values will be 40 times the quantity (1-x) where x is the ratio of the cumulative funding requests for all projects or portions of projects ranked higher by the CoC in Tier 2 plus one half of the funding of the project of interest to the total amount of funding available in Tier 2. For example, if a CoC is eligible to apply for projects totaling \$500,000 in Tier 2.

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and applies for 5 projects ranked in Tier 2 of \$100,000 each, the highest-ranked project would receive 36 points, and then the subsequently ranked projects would receive 28, 20, 12, and 4

 Up to 10 points based on the project application's commitment to follow a housing first approach as defined in section I.B.2.b.(15) of the NOFO. Dedicated HMIS projects and centralized or coordinated assessment system (SSO-CE) projects will automatically receive 10 points.

Per the approved Grant Inventory Worksheet provided by HUD, the San Bernardino City and County CoC's ARD is \$16,141,321. Tier 1 is equal to 90% of the ARD. Therefore, 10% (\$1,614,132) of the ARD renewal agencies will need to be placed into Tier 2.

On September 23, 2024, the GRC met to approve the:

- Selection of CoC renewal applications, scoring, ranking, and tiering, and
- Prioritization, rating, ranking and tiering of all new project activities concerning new and renewal applications for the CoC Grant application, including the scoring and placement of the 2024 CoC Bonus project.

The Office of Homeless Services received a total of five applications for the regular CoC Bonus and one application for the DV Bonus. See attachment #A for a table summarizing the regular CoC Bonus applications and the DV Bonus application received and scores by the GRC members.

Note: One agency (Genesis Reentry Services) submitted an application for a Supportive Services Only -Coordinated Entry" project type. The GRC rejected this application as it was requesting funding for a Coordinated Entry System (CES) outside of the existing CES.

The GRC and OHS are requesting the approval of the following CoC Grant Renewals, Planning, and DV and CoC Bonus applications, as indicated in the attached Item #7a for submission through the Collaborative Application to HUD as recommended by the GRC and approved by the ICH.

Please note: Pursuant to statute and the program regulations, the CoC Governing Board (ICH) and HUD retain the ability to revise the funding levels and reallocate funds as needed for the benefit of the CoC.
