A. Call to Order	Co-Chair Robin Schlosser called to order at 10:03 a.m.

D. Round Table Introductions	9 members of the public attended in-person, they introduced themselves.
E. Individual Committee Member Comments (3 minutes each)	 Co-Chair Robin Schlosser opened the floor for comment from the EDRSC Board members. Board Member Curtis Yakimow announced that the Town of Yucca Valley is entering its strategic planning and budget cycle for fiscal years 26-28. He encouraged public engagement in the process. Board Member Glen Harris shared that former field representative Mark Lundquist passed away. Co-Chair Stone James reported that the City of Twentynine Palms will be finalizing a five-year strategic plan on December 9, 2025. The plan focuses on "who are we today and then who do we want to become in 20 years?" The county is working to ensure steering committees comply with the Brown Act. He expects there will be more rules to ensure compliance. Initial comments will be limited to three minutes and SB707 modernization of the Brown Act. Board Member Lakita Johnson mentioned that Molding Hearts is receiving many call for individuals needing housing that are outside of the area. She stressed the importance of referring clients with substance abuse issues to 211. Commended board member Janet Johnston for providing informative information. Board Member Janet Johnston updated re: attending the COC county board meeting, Residence and Rescue fundraiser, and discord communication. She shared that the Morongo Basin Housing Solutions (Working Group) meeting on November 6th had 20 attendees, their next meeting is scheduled for December 4, 9:30am – 11am. The Continuum of Care vision statement and strategic goals is in draft process. Friday, November 21, 2025 is the release data for a Request for Proposal for motel owners to rent out rooms via the county. The HUD Continuum of

H. Received presentation from Reach Out Yucca Valley's Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) Program.	Carrie Kish from Reach Out Yucca Valley presented on the Medication Assted Treatment (MAT) Program. The MAT program is an access program, partnering with doctors and the Morongo Basin Healthcare District to provide appointments and prescribe medication. Supportive services include covering initial doctor visits and medication costs, help with scheduling, partial help with housing/utility costs (up to \$400), bus passes/Uber fares, telehealth station, resume/workforce development assistance, weekly support group, emergency food/clothing/hygiene, opiate overdose reversal training/Narcan, and goal coaching.
	Discussion ensued re: Grant Sources and Funding. Primary grant sources include County of San Bernardino Behavioral Health (substance use disorders), and California Department of Health (California Opioid Prevention Network). No cuts to grants have been made due to substance use prevention remaining a high priority. Handout and Carrie Kish's contact

Claudia Doyle, Program Specialist II, Office of Homeless Services is preparing the HHAP 4 Request for Proposal and expects to have it completed this week and San Bernardino County hopes to release it by the end of the year (2025). Inland Housing Solution should be under contract by December and operational in January for rapid rehousing referrals. All referrals must go through the Coordinated Entry System (CES), accessed via 211. New Continuum of Care grants require HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) compliance.
J.	Receive update on Homeless Housing Assistance Program (HHAP) Round 5.	Co-Chair Stone James provided the following update on Homeless Housing Assistance Program (HHAP) Round 5. The original plan was to use \$346,258.00 (amount based on the 2023 Point in Time Count numbers) across five categories: prevention/shelter diversion, street outreach, rapid rehousing, service coordination and support systems. The funding amount has been reduced to \$117,233.90 due to the use of 2025 Point in Time Count numbers. Other committees complained, insisting on using the 2025 numbers. The state reviewed the information and mandated the use of the 2025 numbers. The initial figure of \$346,258.00 was deemed misinformation.
K.	Receive update on the 2026 Point in Time Count planning.	Debra Breidenbach-Sterling, Human Resources and Risk Manager for the Town of Yucca Valley announced that the 2026 Point in Time Count is scheduled for January 22, 2025, beginning at 7a.m., with training session on January 15th, 2026, at the Yucca Valley Community Center. The deployment center for Joshua Tree to Morongo Valley will be at Supervisor Rowe's office in Joshua Tree. The deployment center for Twentynine Palms will be at Freedom Plaza in Twentynine Palms. A training video on how to conduct the interview is being created, with a request to include information specific to the regions population. An evidence-based approach to treating opioid use disorder (OUD). It involves FDA-approved medication, along with counseling and individualized support, to provide a comprehensive treatment approach for individuals struggling with dependency.

Dependency is a chronic brain disease characterized by drug seeking and use that is compulsive, or difficult to control, despite harmful consequences.





Treating Opioid Use Disorder During Pregnancy



OUD and Pregnancy

Managing opioid use disorder (OUD) during pregnancy is crucial for the health of both mother and baby. Collaborate with healthcare providers to create a treatment plan including medication-assisted treatment (MAT) and counseling. Attend all prenatal appointments and communicate openly with your healthcare team. With proper care, you can manage OUD and have a healthy pregnancy.

What to Know

- Buprenorphine can stop and prevent withdrawal as well as reduce the craving of opioids.
- All hospitals must report to state child welfare agencies when a mother who is using substances gives birth. It is not used to remove your baby from your care but to make sure that a safe care plan is put into place for you and the baby.







Do ask about both the risks and benefits of taking buprenorphine during pregnancy.

Do talk to your providers about adjusting medication dosage if experiencing cravings or withdrawal symptoms.

Do ask about counseling and recovery support services as part of your treatment.

Do ensure your treatment plan addresses cooccurring medical or behavioral health issues.

Do ask for a comprehensive pain management plan for during and after delivery.

Don't



Don't use any alcohol or medications that might counteract with your OUD medication.

Don't let your OUD go untreated.

Treatment medications such as Buprenorphine can be used safely during pregnancy as prescribed by your doctor. You want to prevent your baby from experiencing NAS.

Don't adjust your medication without your doctors advice.

Adjusting the medication dose on your own can cause you to get sick.



What to expect when you meet with a healthcare provider about OUD treatment and pregnancy

Creating a treatment plan involves collaboration between you and your healthcare team. It starts with discussing the risks and benefits of medications to find the best fit for your needs. Your healthcare provider will consider any other medical conditions or behavioral health issues that might affect your treatment. They will also advise on involving family and friends and suggest support groups and resources to aid your recovery. This approach ensures your treatment plan is personalized and effective. Here at Reach Out we can enroll you in a Medication Assisted Treatment Program where we can navigate clients to resources to help improve the quality of their live



Naloxone in 60 seconds

NARCAN (nasal spray) refers to a form of naloxone, a medication used to rapidly reverse opioid overdose. Naloxone is an opioid receptor antagonist, meaning it binds to opioid receptors in the brain and reverses the effects of opioids. Narcan, in its nasal spray form, is specifically designed for easy and





Steps for Narcan Administration

#1: Evaluate:

Evaluate for signs of opioid overdose:

- · Cold and clammy skin
- Small pupils and eves rolling into the head
- Lips and nails turning blue



- Snoring and choking sound
- Slow, shallow or absent breaths
- Unconscious or limp body







#2: Call for Help

An opioid overdose needs immediate medical attention. Please call 911 immediately.



#3: Administer Naloxone


- Remove the Narcan Nasal Spray from its packaging.
- Place the tip of the nozzle in one nostril until your fingers touch the person's nose.
- If the person remains unresponsive or breathing is still slow after 2-3 minutes, administer a second dose in the other nostril.



#4: Support Their Breathing - Lay Them in **Recovery Position**


Respiratory support is an important if the person is having trouble breathing.

Once they are breathing normally lay them in a recovery position as shown in the picture.



#5: Monitor Response

Continue to monitor the person's breathing and provide any additional doses as necessary until professional help arrives.







Naloxone Storage & Disposal



Naloxone Storage:



- Follow manufacturer instructions for storing naloxone. Storage instructions may be different depending on the brand or type.
- · Keep naloxone in its box until ready to use.
- · Protect from light.

- Store at room temperature below 77° F (25°C).
- Do not freeze or expose to heat above 104°F (40°C).
- Store in safe location.

Naloxone Disposal:

- Unused Naloxone: Dispose of unused naloxone at local pharmacy or through a medicine take-back program.
- Used Naloxone: Nasal spray, such as Narcan: Put the used naloxone nasal spray back into its box. Dispose of it in solid waste trash.

Expired Naloxone:

Narcan nasal spray shelf-life extension: The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved an extended shelf-life for the nasal spray formulation of naloxone from two years (24 months) to 3 years (36 months).

Common Questions About Narcan

Who should not use NARCAN nasal spray?

Do not use NARCAN Nasal Spray if you are allergic to naloxone hydrochloride (HCI) or any of the ingredients in NARCAN Nasal Spray, which include:

- · Benzalkonium chloride (preservative).
- · Disodium ethylenediaminetetraacetic (stabilizer).
- Sodium chloride.
- Hydrochloric acid (to adjust pH).
- Sterile water.

Can NARCAN nasal spray be used on a child?

Yes. The safety and effectiveness of NARCAN Nasal Spray has been established in pediatric patients for known suspected opioid overdose.

Can I give myself NARCAN nasal spray?

No, treatment of suspected opioid overdose must be performed by someone other than the affected person.

Is NARCAN nasal spray addictive?

No, naloxone has no potential for abuse or overdose. It does not work in absence of opioids.

Is it possible to use only half of the contents of NARCAN nasal spray?/Can I reuse NARCAN?

No, you cannot reuse NARCAN Nasal Spray. Each device is single-use, single-dose only. The device is designed and FDA approved to provide a single 4 mg dose of naloxone.

Will more than one dose be needed?

Repeat doses may be necessary. One dose of naloxone may not be enough to reverse the effects if an opioid overdose. Sometimes, the naloxone dose can wear off before the opioids - necessitating another dose.

How long does NARCAN remain in someone's system?

Studies on healthy adults have shown the half-life of NARCAN Nasal Spray to be approximately 2 hours. (For comparison, the half-life of opioids can range from under an hour to 36 hours.)

Does NARCAN nasal spray only work in the nose?

Kratom & 7-0H Fact Sheet

WHAT IS KRATOM? WHAT IS 7-OH?

Kratom is a tree found in Southeast Asia. Its leaves contain compounds that have mind-altering, or psychotropic, effects. Kratom is frequently marketed and sold as an herbal extract or dietary supplement to boost energy/mood and relieve pain. In kratom leaves, 7-Hydroxymitragynine (7-OH) is present in very small amounts. Most 7-OH is produced by chemically converting another compound found in kratom called mitragynine. This transformation can occur naturally in the liver or be synthesized in a laboratory. Some companies extract (or concentrate) 7-OH and sell it in products labeled as either 7-OH or kratom. It's important to know which you're consuming, as 7-OH is much more potent than natural kratom. Some people purchasing what they think is low-potency kratom could actually be purchasing the stronger compound, 7-OH.

HOW IS KRATOM & 7-OH USED?

Kratom is typically ingested orally in the form of capsules, extracts, or tablets. The leaves can also be chewed, dried, crushed, or brewed and consumed as a tea. 7-OH is often sold in pills, gummies, or shots.

IS KRATOM & 7-OH LEGAL?

Kratom and kratom products, such as 7-OH, are not regulated at the national level and can be legally sold in California. While these products are widely available, none have been approved by the Federal Drug Administration (FDA). There are ongoing measures to regulate 7-OH.

CAN YOU OVERDOSE?

WHAT ARE THE EFFECTS OF KRATON?

At low doses, kratom often acts as a stimulant, leading to effects like increased energy, enhanced alertness, and faster heart rate. At higher doses, it tends to produce sedative, pain-relieving effects similar to opioids, which is why some users report relaxation and pain reduction, along with slowed breathing and drowsiness.

Some people use kratom to relieve symptoms of opioid withdrawal, yet kratom is short-acting and can require higher doses taken more frequently.

Consistent use may lead to dependency and withdrawal symptoms like muscle aches, irritability, and sleep disturbances. If consistently used with Kava, a similar plant often taken for relaxation, they might experience withdrawal effects similar to benzodiazepine withdrawal.

Side effects of kratom include:

- Euphoria
- Sedation
- · Pain relief
- Increased energy, focus
- Anxiety
- Nausea and vomiting
- Dry mouth

- Irritability
- Seizures
- Itching
- Constipation
- Sweating
- Confusion
- Rapid heartbeat

Kratom acts as a partial opioid agonist that does not activate the pathway in the brain that is involved in respiratory depression, or when you breathe too slowly or too shallowly. Therefore, kratom is much less likely to contribute to overdose deaths than heroin, fentanyl, oxycodone, or other potent opioids.

When mitragynine, the primary alkaloid in kratom, is identified in overdose cases, it is almost always found along with other drugs with known lethal potential. Nevertheless, people who use kratom should not assume it is without risk, especially when combined with other drugs.

7-OH is 13x stronger than morphine, and with this potency, we see an increased risk of respiratory depression. 7-OH has a higher risk for overdose than kratom, especially with high amounts or when mixed with other drugs.

IS TREATMENT AVAILABLE?

While there are no FDA-approved medications specifically for kratom and kratom product dependence, healthcare providers might use medication approved for the treatment of opioid use disorder to treat a patient's kratom dependence. While studies are limited, findings do suggest that buprenorphine (Suboxone) can be used as an effective treatment option for kratom use disorder. DOES NALOXONE (NARCAN) WORK ON KRATOM?

The treatment for kratom overdose is like the treatment for opioid overdose, since overdoses involving kratom are often accompanied by other drugs, like opioids, that slow or stop breathing. This includes using naloxone (Narcan), providing rescue breaths, and getting medical attention right away.

HOW DO I GIVE SOMEONE NALOXONE (NARCAN)?

Support the person's neck with your hand and allow the head to tilt back. Gently insert the tip of the nozzle into one nostril, until your fingers on either side of the nozzle are against the bottom of their nose. Press the plunger firmly to give the dose.






