Rolling Start offers five core services which include: 1. Information and Referral. Can connect their clients with up-to-the-minute resources, in collaboration with their many partners. 2. Peer Support/Social Gatherings. Computer Classes, Game Days, Movie Days, Support Groups (Coed, Youth, Spanish and LGBTQ) activities for clients. 3. Systems & Individual Advocacy. One of the core beliefs of the Independent Living Philosophy is that disability is part of human diversity. G. Special CoC Board Meeting – June 26, 2025	Anna Ulibarri	<p>Urban Initiatives presented the 2025 PIT Report for board approval and submission to HUD. The report reflected a -9.85 reduction in the unsheltered homeless population. However, it was noted that 150 people in one region were not entered into the count on the day of. One key factor was that 35.9% of unsheltered people were homeless for the first time during the 12 months prior to the count. More than 1/3. Approval of Funding for HHIP was also agendized. H. City Forum and Comments:	Anna Ulibarri	<p>the CV were recommended for funding, unfortunately the item was tabled for the next CoC Board Meeting. HHAP Round 6 MOU was approved as of June 25<sup>th</sup> between OHS and the SB CoC.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• City of San Bernardino – Moving forward with the Navigation Center. Secured additional funding for the project. Additional partnerships (SB 46 – Drug Treatment Laws) will begin in January 2026.</li> <li>• City of Fontana – Phil Burum/Deputy City Manager reported the 1-year anniversary of the Path, a Homeless Prevention and Resource Center. Currently serving 29 people, housed 11 new people and working with the County of Board of Supervisors, elected officials for continued funding for improvements and operations. The city also purchased a three-unit complex to house families, collaborating with the Rivers Edge Ranch to provide supportive wrap around services.</li> <li>• Sheriff Omar Bullard - SB Probation Dept – Announced that he will now be full time with the Sheriff HOPE Team. Also announced the next Shelter Court is coming up on July 30<sup>th</sup>. Need vendors and volunteers for the event.</li> <li>• Jeff Allen – City of Grand Terrace – Has been working with the HOPE Team and they have been a huge help with outreach to the unsheltered population in the city.</li> <li>• David Rabindranath - City of Redlands – Rolling out ERF Round 3 grant. Funding will increase more beds and shelters in the city. Partnering with new service providers – Reentry Clinical and Housing is one of the new partners and Anthony Brazier and his team will provide beds and services for the reentry population. The grant will also increase the homeless services workforce and street medicine program.</li> </ul>

Public Comment (3 mins each speaker)</p>	<p>The meeting was called to order at 1:03p</p> <p>Attendees introduced themselves and stated the agency they represented.</p> <p><b>Pastor Paul Jones</b> – from Benjamin E Jones Resource Center announced that with the ERF Rapid Rehousing funds they are administering for the City of San Bernardino, they <u>cannot receive direct referrals</u>. All referrals must be submitted to the City of San Bernardino and staff will then send referral to BEJRC to provide the services. Gabby Leon city staff will be assisting with the process.</p> <p><b>Demarius Carmichael</b> – Deputy Director of Veterans Affairs introduced himself to the CV Region service providers and agencies and announced that his agency is the touch point for the many services the county provides for veterans. His office can connect the veterans to services, including Health Care. They have three different locations to service clients: San Bernardino, Rancho Cucamonga and Hesperia. He is eager to partner with other providers and agencies that provide services to veterans.</p> <p><b>Jeff Allen</b> – City Council Member – Grand Terrace, thanked Mr. Carmichael for his comments and noted that there are numerous disabled veterans that are homeless and need services. These veterans are left on the edge as their disability checks leave them with enough money <u>not to</u> qualify for benefits and not enough money to live on. Asked to please contact your elected officials and advocate for veterans.</p>

Presentation – <b>PROP 1</b> - San Bernardino County of Behavioral Health's Integrated Plan to Transform Behavioral Health Services and Outcomes:</p>	<p><b>Question</b> – ZaZette Scott – Out of the 32 client's that were referred, how many services have received their services? <b>Answer</b> -Most of the 32 clients are in the process of receiving the services.</p> <p>Maribel Gutierrez – Deputy Director Community Engagement and Equity Service for the Department of Behavioral Health, County of San Bernardino presented the Prop 1: Behavioral Health Services Act (BHSA) overview: Prop 1 was approved by the voters in March 2024. The prop changes how the millionaire's tax funds are spent. There are two parts of the package. The first is the reallocation of funding from MHSA to BHSA and increases the state allocation from 5% to 10%, policy changes include allowances for treatment for people with substance use disorders, accountability increased and expanded reporting requirements, and the second component is the Infrastructure Bond Program of 6.4B dollars. The bond act of 2024 is for capital projects such as new treatment beds and supportive housing units. The focus is housing for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness with behavioral health needs with a dedicated investment to serve veterans. 4.4 billion is for grants to public or private entities for behavioral health treatment and residential housing. 1.5 billion will be awarded only to California cities and tribal entities. 2 billion will be allocated to the California Department of Housing and Community Development to support supportive housing. 1<sup>st</sup> Round of the infrastructure grants were awarded, and the 2<sup>nd</sup> round is now open. The 2<sup>nd</sup> round will close in the early fall, per Maribel Gutierrez.</p> <p><b>If you are interested in applying for the infrastructure grant, please contact DBH for the information on where to find the RFP criteria.</b></p> <p><b>Maribel Gutierrez, Deputy Director 909-388-0830</b>  <a href="mailto:maribel.gutierrez@dbh.sbcounty.gov">maribel.gutierrez@dbh.sbcounty.gov</a></p> <p>The Department of Public Health will also be receiving 4% of the funding from Prop 1 and has released their policy guide on how they are moving forward utilizing their funding. County Behavioral Health provides services to Medi-Cal members of Inland Empire Health Plan, Kaiser and Molina.</p> <p><b>Questions:</b></p> <p><b>Anna Ulibarri</b> – When will the agencies be able to access info for the capital grants (see M. Gutierrez contact info) and can we be involved right now in the stakeholders' meetings so our input can be heard?</p> <p><b>Dr. Belford</b> – Yes. For the C pack meetings, you can go to the website for the info. They are being facilitated all over the county. You can also reach out to Maribel for more information or if you would like to host a meeting.</p> <p><b>Gabby Leon</b> – Is there a way to force a client with mental health challenges to accept services without a legal ruling?</p> <p><b>Dr. Belford</b> – The legal system has no hold over anyone unless they are a harm to themselves or harm to someone else or have a severe disability</p>
