E. CV HHAP Round 5 – Anna Ulibarri-	Funding Overview:
	Funding for Central Valley: 3,158,863 – allotment for CV region, for the total of all regions it is 4,946,544. The funding for CV is placed in 6 categories. Rapid Rehousing, Prevention and Shelter Diversion, Delivery of Permanent Housing and Innovative Housing Solutions, Operating Subsidies- Permanent Housing, Street Outreach, Service Coordination, and System Support. Delivery of Permanent Housing and Innovative Housing Solutions – This is categorized when costs support the provision of permanent housing such as Acquisition of land, Renovation of building/land and maintenance being used for permanent housing, Services for people in permanent housing programs. Change of eligible population is added where those who are at risk of homelessness can be added to the delivery of Permanent Housing. Required prioritization of households with income of below 30% of AMI. This has changed from 50-80 AMI. Must certify their income to see if they are eligible for the program. The criteria only apply to those who are at immediate risk, meaning that they are not homeless, if they are homeless then the criteria do not apply to them. If the person who is in this program under the criteria is to gain more than 30% AMI, it would not change anything because this is not for temporary housing due to them gaining a lease and if they are to get raises then the lease agreement would update along with their salary. Operating Subsidies- Permanent Housing – Tied to permanent housing, operating for renovation is not applicable to the County due to the County itself is not applying to it. The reason is because you must prove that there is more permanent housing than interim housing and the

County could not provide that proof. **Street Outreach** – Is eligible to apply for the funding. Our goal as a region is to connect with them and coordinate with them to move them on to the next step. This is payment to the staff and other employees that help those who are homeless. There should be evidence-based street engagement services, Harm reduction services, Assertive community treatment, etc. **Services Coordination** – This goes along with the wrap around services within the rapid rehousing category. As well as access to workforce, education, and training programs. Rapid Rehousing – This is tenant based within the community, this is time limited/ permanent housing. Wrap around services such as Landlord, security deposits, etc. This must be included in the budget breakdown. If the person within the program must be looked towards the longer term with the goal of over a year because if the person becomes homeless again within a year it does not look good on the County and can hurt the future funding. **Prevention and Shelter Division –** There are no motel vouchers at all, motel vouchers fell into interim housing operation cost. There is NO funding for motel vouchers. **INFORMATION SHARING/ANNOUNCEMENTS** F. B. Welcome and Introductions – Anna Ulibarri	Attendees introduced themselves and stated the agency they represented.
C. Public Comment (3 mins each speaker)	Ruth Humphrey: Children's fund will be holding 4 sessions for training for those who want to partner with them. These training courses are for the NAR request due to the request being incorrect and causing most to be denied. September 11th and 19th are the scheduled dates for the sessions over zoom due to limited space in facility. Pastor Jones: San Bernardino shelter court will be hosting an event on the 24th of September at Heritage Park on Orange St. Redlands, CA. Shelter court helps those who have warrants and tickets situated by a Judge. If there are any clients that need this, it is recommended that they go on this date due to the possibility that this may be the last event in the lower half of the county before they go back up to the desert area. The tickets and warrants must also be issued in San Bernardino County only. (909) 756-0014 Charlie Pegan: Rebranding the hotels to meet the needs of the programs. Facility has been bought in Colton with 18 units. This can be a facility to centered around young people due to it being close to a college. "State safe housing initiative" email (909) 233-1884

E. Report - CES Regional Hub

Antoinette Ortega from CES – reported the numbers for the Central Valley Region, for the month of August

255 – Enrollments and Universal Assessment during case conferencing

43 – Outreach engagements 39 of them were homeless verifications

30 – Refereed to rapid rehousing for central valley

9- Refereed permanent supporting housing

Success Story:

A man in Fontana that has been homeless since 2022. He did have mental health problems as well as chronic health in which his medication was stolen. Case conferencing has helped him and now he is in the process for PSH.

211 Outreach Process:

- 1. Individuals experiencing homelessness call 211 and complete a BISCADAC assessment.
- 2. They are placed on an outreach list.
- 3. The outreach team (Antony and Leandra) meets with individuals in the field to verify their situation, gather necessary documentation for housing, and provide hygiene items or food if available.
- 4. All documents are uploaded to the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), making the client's profile visible to partner agencies for case conferencing.
- 5. The current turnaround time from being placed on the list to being met by the outreach team is approximately one to two weeks.

F. CV Resource Mapping – Presentation

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Department of Veteran Affairs (SB County) Demarius

They are not the Federal VA they are the San Bernardino County VA. The Federal VA is having trouble due to massive layoffs so the County can help the veterans quicker than Federal. Department of Federal affairs have 3 branches in which the County is more focused on Veterans Benefit Administration which helps with compensation, education (college wave fees), life insurance, etc. Veterans do not mean only if you have wartime service, it applies to Military Service members. Video about a veteran named David Rose interviewing about how he served in Vietnam and was wounded but stayed in Vietnam. He was turned down by the El Monte police department for a job but was denied due a mental health evaluation labeling him as a "ticking time bomb" and was referred to the VA but when he was given no help, he developed an attitude of "Forget them". After some time, he would have nightmares that increased after the passing of his mother in which that was the reason he tried going back to VA but to the one located in Rancho Cucamonga. He was pleased that when he entered the first woman he spoke to took his case with no complications. He credits the VA with helping him realize the life he was living in which he thanked them because without the County's help he may not be alive today.

You do not need an appointment for this office. However, an exception is on Fridays because of large turnout on those days. Each veteran service officer is credited by the state of California which means they are trained diligently to help explain benefits and compensation. This is a two-phase process. All services are free because they are funded by the County so there are no bonuses or things of that nature within the office. There are things called "claim sharks" in which these individuals convince a veteran to come with them to the VA but in return they get ¾ of the veteran's compensation. The department of VA (SB County) helps veterans with their health care which is very important. However, the number one reason why

Veterans go to the VA is because of Disability comp. This however is not an easy task for the veteran because of how long the process is which can range from 6 months to 6 years but they help with the entire process.

They do not house veterans, so it is best to know that so if you are referring a homeless veteran to their office to make sure they know that they do not provide housing but can refer the Veteran to different programs that do housing.

VA home loan limit has increased, SB County is 1 million, Orange County is 1.2 million, LA County is 1.2 million, Riverside County is 1 million.

480 million was given back to veterans.

Main office is on Hospitality Street in San Bernardino.

Launch Pad by Robert Carrillo:

1 in 4 former foster youth end up in jail and 50% of chronically homeless adults experience housing instability as young people. Governor Newsom passed a bill where California needs to build 8000 units by 2029 but as of to-date only 500 units have been built. Launch Pad is a mixed use/mixed income economic hub where the ground floor micro retail for businesses and upper floor is housing for youth coming out of foster care, transitional age youth, immigrant youth and veteran women with children.

Ground floor has 10,500 sq. ft where it will have a daycare, commercial kitchen, incubator spaces, retail spaces and shipping container farm where the produce made there will be used in the commercial kitchen.

This is all built off site to save time and money in which not using low-income tax credits.

Yvette Romaro (Director of Operations)

Ruben Mendoza (Housing and Economic Analyst)

The building will consist of 32 residential units, 16 - studios, 14 - 3 bedroom, 2 - 2 bedrooms. Replicating it 4 times so in total will be 128 units.

Studios will rent for 1300 a month and 3 bedrooms for 2300 a month. Lock down for master leasing for 99 years max and they want to build the building by 2026 starting in December of 2025.







Street Outreach Role

Salvation Army & City of San Bernadino Outreach (ERF)

- **Engagement:** Meet people where they are on the streets, in parks, at encampments.
- Navigation: Connect individuals to shelter, housing, healthcare, mental health, food and social services.
- Advocacy: Help clients overcome barriers to stability.
- Safety and Support: Reduce risk for individuals and the broader community.





ERF - Project Scope of Work

The City of San Bernardino's Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF) project aims to provide housing solutions and supportive services for 110 unhoused individuals within a 5.2-mile prioritized encampment area. This multi-faceted approach supports various services, from permanent housing placement to prevention and essential services for individuals.





San Bernardino PD – PEACE Team

San Bernardino PD includes a specialized unit called the **PEACE Team** they focus on a mix of enforcement, safety and community support.

Proactive Enforcement: Conducts proactive patrols to identify and address potential issues before they escalate.

Responds to concerns from residents, businesses, and property owners regarding unauthorized use of private property.

Community Outreach: Works directly with individuals experiencing homelessness. Engaging with individuals in the public right-of-way (streets, sidewalks, parks, and other public spaces), ensuring safety, accessibility, and compliance with local ordinances.

Partnership Work: Collaborates with other city departments, nonprofits, and service providers. Bridges the gap between traditional policing and social service response.





Interim Shelter Program

- Service Provider: VARP, Inc.
- Service Description: Supportive interim housing for individuals from prioritized encampment
- Capacity and Service Duration:
 - 18 beds: 12 male, 6 female
 - 42 individuals served annually
 - Up to 6 months stay (case-by-case extensions)
- Specific Services:
 - Safe accommodations, meals, mental health counseling, medical access, case management, housing placement






Key Impact






