


# Agency Allocation vs Expenditure


## Agency Allocation vs Expenditure


## Agency Allocation vs Expenditure

<p>Receive an update from the County of San Bernardino on the establishment of a Homelessness Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) to address homelessness in the County of San Bernardino in accordance with Assembly Bill (AB) 210 and AB 728.</p>	<p>Diane Rundles, County of San Bernardino</p>	<p>The Chair opened item #1 and recognized Diane Rundles.</p> <p>Diane Rundles provided the following information:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Introduced the Homeless Multidisciplinary Team and the progress the County has made in data sharing efforts. There has been a barrier to servicing in the community when it comes to access, to information and being able to assess individuals in real time that are moving through the County system. This affects the County's ability to see data at a high level and be able to make decisions about resource allocation and make policy decisions.</li> <li>The County understands that this has also created a gap with the community providers and their ability to also understand what services are available through various county departments. For this reason, the County has brought together thirteen County departments to see how they can lawfully share data. This will allow the County to strategize effectively on homelessness issues. We are working with County Counsel to develop internal agreements on data sharing. On August 13, 2025, Memorandum of Understandings (MOUs) was signed by the thirteen departments in the Homeless MDT.</li> <li>Next steps include, Leveraging HMIS as Intern Data Sharing Platform, Execution of Data Sharing Agreements and Development of a Data Sharing Platform.</li> </ul> <p>The Chair opened the items for public comments. No public comments were made.</p> <p>Discussion and Questions from the Board:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Paul Fournier– Asked which thirteen entities are involved. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Diane Rundles– Responded Sheriff's department, Public Defenders, Veterans Affairs, Probation Department, Public Health, Office of Homeless Services, Community Development and Housing, Behavioral Health, Department of Aging and Adult Services, Transitional Assistance Department.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Marcus Dillard commented that The County is a large social system that needs to be aligned before it can include the public/providers. This approach does not eliminate getting feedback from the providers or regions, the County just needs to align first before including the public.</li> <li>Shanikqua Freeman – Asked to confirm that the objective is to phase in the development, implementation and integration of the providers. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Diane Rundles–Responded the data will be beneficial for all entities involved.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Shanikqua Freeman – Questioned if the oversight is limited to the County. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Diane Rundles–Responded that ultimately data will be beneficial for all entities involved. However, the County is working with County Counsel because personal information is highly protected. How it will all work out with the provider community, is still being determined.</li> <li>Marcus Dillard–Responded HMIS access is part of the data initiative.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Shanikqua Freeman – Questioned if the oversight is limited to the County.</li> </ul>
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- Diane Rundles–Responded that governance is currently with the County as the County works out how it will share data internally. The next step once internal County data sharing has been aligned will be to include the provider community.
- Shanikqua Freeman – Asked if HMIS is a large part of data collection, is there consideration to assist with smaller providers to be able to allocate staff to commit to data collection and reporting in a timely manner?
  - Marcus Dillard– HUD requires reporting through HMIS, not the County. HUD provides funding for programs; however, they do not allocate specific funding to the County to fund everyone's HMIS. One of the objectives of data sharing is so providers will get to see the different departments that clients have already communicated with for services.
- Sue Walker–asked if there are changes in how providers enter into HMIS?
  - Marcus Dillard– Responded that the HMIS team has been working with providers to improve data entry.
- Sandra Ibarra– Questioned the integration of 211.
  - Diane Rundles–Responded that MDT is one component of what the County is doing to address homelessness, and the intake process is a separate topic. The County will also look at how data sharing connects with the intake process and allow providers to problem solve in real time.
- Carrie Harmon– Stated the MDT is to ensure the County is effective at moving people through multiple departments and that they are getting services they need to reach stability. This will allow the provider community to see what they can provide, by knowing what the County can and has provided already.
- Antoinette Jackson– Questioned why the MDT had not been presented to the community last year and if there is an advisory committee, is it only made up of county departments.
  - Diane Rundles–Responded there is a lot of preliminary work that needed to be done, getting buy-in from the departments and having them on board before presenting the MDT to the community. The next steps are to work with a contractor to best integrate all the data into a shared system. Once this is accomplished, we can then move to integrate the community.
- Maelena Enriquez– Clarified the purpose of the MDT is to provide faster, more efficient access to data that will assist providers better serve the community.
  - Diane Rundles–Confirmed that her understanding was correct.
- Karen Young-Lowe– Commented she understands the MDT purpose will assist providers in applying for funding, since data will be in one place instead of searching for information through various departments.
  - Diane Rundles–Responded the community will be included to provide data.
  - Marcus Dillard–Responded data will be a benefit to the full picture, for data driven decisions to be made.
- Paul Fournier– Asked if the information about the MDT is published on a website.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Diane Rundles–Responded the information is not on any website where updates are being given, but that is something she is willing to share the information with the CoC Board repeatedly asked.</li> </ul> <p>There being no further discussion, the Chair closed item #1.</p>

Erika Lewis Huntley, Chair, PITC Oversight Committee	<p>The Chair opened item #2 and recognized Erika Lewis Huntley.</p> <p>Erika Lewis Huntley provided the following information:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● The Point in Time Count was conducted January 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2026.</li> <li>● There were over 800 registered volunteers.</li> <li>● OHS conducted 19 in person and virtual training.</li> <li>● Over 3000 hygiene backpacks were distributed.</li> </ul> <p>The Chair opened the items for public comments.</p> <p>No public comments were made.</p> <p>Discussion and Questions from the Board:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Maelena Enriquez– Stated she is concerned about the time frame of the PITC and would recommend in the future a later time frame for the count would be beneficial. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Carrie Harmon- Responded the numbers are not perfect.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● Maelena Enriquez– Questioned what if the numbers do not decrease. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ Supervisor Joe Baca Jr., - Thanked Miss Enriquez for her comments and mentioned that her input would be helpful for the next PITC.</li> <li>○ Erika Lewis Huntley –Responded the numbers are imperfect, when looked at in a silo. The PITC is a snapshot of a specific point in time. The data needs to be looked at together with other data that is available through HMIS, the city's data and the schools have.</li> </ul> </li> <li>● David Rabindranath –Restated that the PITC is an imperfect number. The count is done in the winter, as that is when more people are seeking shelter. In the past a youth count was conducted in the afternoon, whereas more- homeless youth might be out.</li> <li>● Supervisor Joe Baca Jr., -Thanked everyone for comments and work, thanked OHS, Erika Lewis-Huntley for her leadership in the PITC Committee.</li> </ul> <p>There being no further discussion, the Chair closed item #2.</p>

Dear Application Review Committee,

The San Bernardino County Continuum of Care (CoC) is pleased to support Lighthouse Social Service Centers (LightHouse) in their Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 Priority 3 Renewal Grant Application for San Bernardino County (18-CA-171).

LightHouse is a valued SSVF grantee serving the Inland Empire of Southern California and a key partner in the CoC's coordinated efforts to prevent and end veteran homelessness in San Bernardino County. The agency plays an integral role in delivering rapid re-housing, homeless prevention, outreach, and supportive services to homeless and at-risk veterans. LightHouse consistently seeks innovative and effective pathways to permanent housing, with particular attention to veterans experiencing chronic homelessness. Resources LightHouse provides to the CoC include Grant and Per Diem (GPD) Transitional Living Services; rapid re-housing and homeless prevention through the SSVF Program; Rapid Resolution; Healthcare Navigation; legal services for veterans; Shallow Subsidy assistance through SSVF; and permanent supportive housing for disabled veterans through the LightHouse Hope for Heroes Program.

LightHouse's SSVF Program Manager, Heather Burroughs, facilitates the County of San Bernardino's weekly Homeless Veteran Community Planning Group (HVC PG) meetings. In addition, LightHouse outreach, housing navigation, and case management staff attend these meetings weekly. The HVC PG is responsible for maintaining the veteran by-name list and monitoring housing placement and stabilization outcomes countywide. Participants include SSVF and GPD providers, VA outreach and HUD-VASH staff, Housing Authority representatives, Coordinated Entry System (CES) staff, the County Office of Homeless Services, law enforcement and code enforcement partners, and county housing navigation staff. Together, these partners meet weekly to review the by-name list, conduct case conferencing, and advance progress toward the benchmarks established by the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness and the VA for ending veteran homelessness.

LightHouse staff actively participate in the CoC's coordinated entry assessment process and contributed to the development, capacity building, and implementation of the CES. The agency receives prioritized referrals generated through the CES and utilizes the VI-SPDAT as the local assessment tool to support coordinated screening and referrals. LightHouse intake and case management staff are trained to administer the VI-SPDAT and incorporate it into outreach and service delivery.

San Bernardino County's CES is embedded within the County's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), and LightHouse enters all required veteran data into HMIS while participating in data sharing with veteran providers and the CES. LightHouse also participates regularly in quarterly CoC meetings, and a member of the LightHouse management team attends monthly the Regional Steering Committee meetings. In addition, in 2025, LightHouse CEO Karyn Young-Lowe was elected to the San Bernardino County CoC Board of Governance. LightHouse further contributes to multiple ad hoc workgroups focused on expanding and enhancing services for homeless veterans, individuals, and families throughout the county.

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LightHouse management and direct service staff also play an active role in the planning and execution of veteran stand downs in San Bernardino County, as well as the annual Point-in-Time Count. Fifteen LightHouse staff members, including management personnel, participated in the most recent count held on January 22, 2026, and LightHouse also assisted with transportation for the event.

Ending veteran homelessness in San Bernardino County remains a top priority, and LightHouse is a significant partner in advancing this goal. The CoC views LightHouse as a model program for both veteran and non-veteran service providers committed to rapid re-housing, homeless prevention, and permanent supportive housing. The San Bernardino County Continuum of Care (CoC) is pleased to support LightHouse Social Service Centers (LightHouse) in their Grant and Per Diem (GPD) – Per Diem Only (PDO) Fiscal Year (FY) 2027 Service Intensive Transitional Supportive Housing Renewal Grant Application.

LightHouse is a valued GPD service provider serving the Inland Empire of Southern California and a key partner in the CoC's coordinated efforts to prevent and end veteran homelessness in San Bernardino County. The agency plays an integral role in delivering service intensive transitional supportive housing to homeless male veterans and consistently seeks innovative and effective pathways to permanent housing, with particular attention to veterans experiencing chronic homelessness. Resources LightHouse provides to the CoC include rapid re-housing and homeless prevention through the Supportive Services to Veteran Families (SSVF) Program; Rapid Resolution; Healthcare Navigation; legal services for veterans; Shallow Subsidy assistance through SSVF; and permanent supportive housing for disabled veterans through the LightHouse Hope for Heroes Program. LightHouse also provides comprehensive mental health services and employment services to program participants.

LightHouse's SSVF Program Manager, Heather Burroughs, facilitates the County of San Bernardino's weekly Homeless Veteran Community Planning Group (HVCPG) meetings. GPD Program Manager Amy Hopkins facilitates the meeting if Ms. Burroughs is absent. In addition, LightHouse outreach, housing navigation, and case management staff attend these meetings weekly. The HVCPG is responsible for maintaining the veteran by-name list and monitoring housing placement and stabilization outcomes countywide. Participants include GPD and SSVF staff, VA outreach and HUD-VASH staff, Housing Authority representatives, Coordinated Entry System (CES) staff, the County Office of Homeless Services, law enforcement and code enforcement partners, and county housing navigation staff. Together, these partners meet weekly to review the by-name list, conduct case conferencing, and advance progress toward the benchmarks established by the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness and the VA for ending veteran homelessness.

LightHouse staff actively participates in the CoC's coordinated entry assessment process and contributed to the development, capacity building, and implementation of the CES. The agency receives prioritized referrals generated through the CES and utilizes the VI-SPDAT as the local assessment tool to support coordinated screening and referrals. LightHouse intake and case management staff are trained to administer the VI-SPDAT and incorporate it into outreach and service delivery.

San Bernardino County's CES is embedded within the County's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), and LightHouse enters all required veteran data into HMIS while participating in data sharing with veteran providers and the CES. LightHouse also participates regularly in quarterly CoC meetings, and a member of the LightHouse management team attends monthly the Regional Steering Committee meetings. In

addition, in 2025, LightHouse CEO Karyn Young-Lowe was elected to the San Bernardino County CoC Board of Governance. LightHouse further contributes to multiple ad hoc workgroups focused on expanding and enhancing services for homeless veterans, individuals, and families throughout the county.

LightHouse management and direct service staff also play an active role in the planning and execution of veteran stand downs in San Bernardino County, as well as the annual Point-in-Time Count. Fifteen LightHouse staff members, including GPD Program Manager Amy Hopkins, participated in the most recent count held on January 22, 2026, and LightHouse GPD staff provided transportation for the event.

Ending veteran homelessness in San Bernardino County remains a top priority, and LightHouse is a significant partner in advancing this goal. The CoC views LightHouse as a model program for both veteran and non-veteran service providers committed to transitional supportive housing, rapid re-housing, homeless prevention, and permanent supportive housing. The San Bernardino County Continuum of Care is pleased to support LightHouse Social Service Centers in its Grant and Per Diem FY 2027 Service Intensive Transitional Supportive Housing Renewal Grant Application.

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Approve the recommendation from the West Valley Regional Steering Committee to reallocate \$58,841.87 in Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) Round 2 funds for the West Valley region

The West Valley Regional Steering Committee (WVRSC) held its monthly regional meeting on **January 14, 2026**. Following the meeting, the Office of Homeless Services (OHS) received written notice from WVRSC Co-Chair **Don Smith** requesting that the Continuum of Care (CoC) Board consider the committee's recommendation for the reallocation of **\$58,841.87** in Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) Round 2 funds. On October 20, 2025, Mercy House confirmed discontinuance of services under HHAP 2 contract 22-823. The total contract amount was \$123,256. Of that amount, \$64,414.13 was expended, leaving a remaining balance of \$58,841.87 to be reallocated.

The WVRSC recommends the following allocations:

- **\$58,841.87 allocated for eligible use category Homeless Prevention and Diversion Activities**

The WVRSC proposed allocating the total amount of funding to Inland Valley Hope Partners, subcontractor to Mercy House on the original contract.

Time is of the essence, as these funds must be expended by **June 2026**. Accordingly, the WVRSC approved the above funding distribution and recommends that the Continuum of Care Board adopt this reallocation.
