Noelle Cirilo began her career with the Probation Department as a Probation Officer II in September 2001 and worked in various assignments in Juvenile Supervision, Adult Supervision and Juvenile Investigations/Intake. She was promoted and held the position of Probation Officer III in Juvenile Supervision, Law Enforcement and K9 Units. Office of Homeless Services Update	Marcus Dillard, Office of Homeless Services	<p>The Chair recognized Marcus Dillard to give the Office of Homeless Services update.</p> <p>Marcus Dillard – provided the following updates</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Introduced Christopher Salazar new OHS Housing Administrative Manager • Homeless Housing Assistance Prevention (HHAP) Program Round 4 update <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The HHAP ad-hoc committee, assembled by the ICH Chair and Co-Chair, recommended a financial review be conducted on applicants recommended for funding ○ The financial review came in after the evaluations were conducted on HHAP Round 4 applicants ○ ATC Financial Reviews came back with some ○ The HHAP ad-hoc committee recommended to have the financial review information sent back to the regions to review with all pertinent information ○ HHAP 4 recommendations will be brought back to ICH next month • HHAP funding and CES <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Regional Hub proposals were done with CESH and HHAP 2 funding ○ Contracts expired June 30, 2024 ○ ICH does not have immediate funding available for the Regional Hubs

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ ICH will be looking at HHAP 4 funding that has a 5% set aside for coordinated entry <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ This will require new agreements with the Regional Hubs ▪ Will go out for new proposal and bids ▪ Will not be extending current contracts <p>Discussion and Questions from the Board:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Don Smith – HHAP funding was specifically set-aside to support the CES regional activities. Funding of \$221,000 should be used to initiate a contract with United Way 211 to have them work with the regional hubs and allow them to send out a request for proposals if needed. In September meeting we agreed to have the County set aside 5% of HHAP 4 funding, that is not yet obligated. With the CoC 5% and the County 5% we should be able to meet the requested funding for CES. • Jessica Alexander – Stated that she would like to hear what the actual budget of the regional hubs is. The money set aside may not be enough. We need to know how much is actually needed to run the Regional Hubs. • Wendel Wilson – Has there been any feedback from the State about how our CoC is doing with HHAP funding? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Marcus Dillard – Yes, OHS has been in contact with the State’s Housing and Community Development (HCD) office. ○ OHS has received feedback, it has not been negative, just more of what is needed on our end to provide to them. • Don Smith – State dashboards are available with information on all HHAP funding for both CoC and County and how funding has been obligated. • Curtis Yakimov – One of the frustrations for the East Valley Regional Steering Committees was the inability to consider the financial review results while still being required to make a funding recommendation, so we are ok with the delay and being able to consider them now. • Marcus Dillard – One of the concerns for the review of applications has been finding non-conflicted evaluators, we are looking into how we could best have evaluators do their reviews without feeling pressured. • Sandra Ibarra – Recommended seeking out community members to do evaluations for future HHAP rounds. <p>Being no other question, the Chair closed OHS Updates.</p>
Coordinated Entry System Update	Aziza Manuel, Inland SoCal United Way 211	<p>The Chair recognized Aziza Manuel for an update on Coordinated Entry System (CES)</p> <p>Aziza Manuel – Update on contact center data:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • In FY 2021-22 we had about 37 thousand calls regarding housing, meaning they were at-risk of loosing housing or needed housing. In FY2022-23 call increased to 50 thousand, and in FY 2023-24 call increased to 57 thousand. • The increase in calls demonstrates the need for assistance and resources, which are a challenge to

		<p>provide due to high increase in living cost, most people can not afford rent that continues to go up.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Stats for the regional Hubs of clients served since January 2024 are: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ West Valley Hub – 120 clients through Christian Development Center ○ Central Valley (2 Hubs) 455 clients through the Benjamin E Jones Resource Center (BEJRC) and the Family Assistance Program ○ High Desert Hub – 201 clients through Family Assistance Program ○ Mountains Hub – 294 clients through the Mountain Homeless Coalition ○ East Valley Hub – 100 through Morongo Basin ARCH <p>Kimberly Starrs – continued the Coordinated Entry update</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CESH funds were used partially for software the regional Hubs, some for the Hubs and the rest for United Way 211 as the administrator of the Hubs • Currently on an accelerated spending plan. There was \$475, 000 made available through CESH funding, but the pace that we are on right now will exceed that. • We ask that the Board re-evaluate and increase the funding for the Regional Hubs, as we are spending about \$72,000 a month. <p>Discussion and Questions from the Board:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Paul Fournier – Please categorize what the accelerated spending entails? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Kim Starrs responded - Original hours that were carved out would spend \$475 over a 12-month period, with the accelerated rate and hours available would cover about 6 to 7 months. ○ The original rate was \$22 an hour for work conducted at each 5 regional Hub. We were made aware that that was not a reasonable rate for the work that was being asked from the Regional Access points in the shortened period of time we had available. The rates were raised, and the hours were condensed. Each regional rate was raised at a different rate. • Supervisor Baca – the number one issue is having capacity and resources, the county and other cities are looking to build resources, however in the meantime, if we allocate more funding how will it help if there is no resources or places to place people. How can the county help you, we need to see a proposal on how we can help you. • Don Smith – I want to remind everyone that CES is a mandate, most of the funding we get from the State and Feds require we have a working CES, unfortunately there is no fund attached to the mandate. We have asked that every funding that comes to the CoC have a set aside allocated for CES. What is the baseline funding you need to continue operations of the Regional HUBs? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Kim Starrs responded - The request was to re-evaluate, with the current rate of spending and activities and not adding any additional items or changing anything it would be \$864,000. • Diana Alexander – we all agree you need more money, but it would be helpful for us (Board) to see a report on the rates at each Hub and how the rates are determined. • Sharon Green – It is critical to fix this system, when it works our communities are safe. We need to figure out the dollar amount.
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		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sandra Ibarra – We need to find out how we’re going to fix the system so that when someone calls, they are not given number after number to call, agency after agency. They need to be helped. • Jessica Alexander – We had month of planning to get to this point, and it would be a shame not to continue. We do need to figure out what they need to get a full year of funding to get accurate data for a full year of activities. • Paul Fournier – not every solution requires a dollar amount, we need to look at the churches to assist. I was surprised with the Mountains and the number of clients served for a single agency; they pull strings wherever they can. • Diana Alexander – We need to see the big picture to see where we’re at. Look at it collectively so we can come up with a solution that last, not just a temporary band-aid. • Marcus Dillard - If the ask is about \$800,000 annually, for perspective the 5% from HHAP and even if the County matches it, it will not cover the requested amount, and we’ll be right back at this same conversation in six-months or a year. We may need to take this into consideration and consider that the ask may be higher. • Sharon Green – wanted to remind everyone that we are all the system, not just 211. • Don Smith – We need planning and coordination, as we did a big study in 2020, we put a taskforce together that met for 2 years to come up with plans, we settled on the regional hubs, but we need to stick to it and build on top of what we have. • Wendel Wilson – Relating to capacity of 211 CES works for us. We have a help line that volunteers staff five days a week, sometimes on the weekends. We get roughly 100 calls a month, half of those come from down the hill, keeping in mind that all of our funding is designated for the Mountains. These calls consist of frustrated people, because the people they were referred to by 211 are not answering their calls. If it was one or two calls then ok, but it’s an everyday from multiple people, they don’t get to talk to a person. Non-profits need to answer their phones and talk to the people. • Wayne Hamilton – In 2023-24 shows you had just over 147,000 contacts, this year since Jan 2024 you had 1,170 calls? How does that work, do calls go to you and you refer to the regional hubs? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Kim Starrs responded that the 1,170 number is contacts made directly by the regional hubs, not calls. The top section is 211 data, and the bottom section is regional hubs data. 

- Family Assistance Program be awarded \$334,050.12.
 - Their coverage of the 12–17-year-old population was strongest, and we recommend some emphasis on this group. This project also provided coverage in multiple regions.
