Evaluator’s Recommendations:

There were three applications submitted for the West Valley Region. Mercy House received the top score of 100, the City of Montclair received the second highest score of 78, and Brilliant Corners received the last score of 71.25.

Based on the scoring and discussion, the Regional Evaluator’s have recommended that Mercy House received 75% of the awarded amount for a total of \$123,256 and City of Montclair receive the 25% balance amount of \$41,085.

Brilliant Corners was not recommended to received grant funding for HHAP-2.

2021 Continuum of Care (CoC) Award Announcement

On March 14, 2022, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced the award of \$2.6 billion in CoC Homeless Assistance Grant projects.

These grants awarded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will provide agencies within the County of San Bernardino over \$14 million to provide transitional housing and furnish permanent housing in the form of rapid rehousing and permanent supportive housing, coordination of CoC planning activities, as well as funds to support the countywide Coordinated Entry System for those experiencing homelessness.

HUD's decision to award these programs will bring nearly \$15 million directly to agencies within the County of San Bernardino to fund twenty-two (22) projects.



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

- **Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) Round 3** – The SBC&C CoC was allocated \$3.9 million, and the County was allocated \$3.6 million in HHAP Round 3 funding. OHS submitted the Standard Agreement to Apply for HHAP Rd 3 funds in October 2021 and has received an initial 20% disbursement of the CoC funding (\$780k) which is to be used to complete the required Local Homelessness Action Plan and fund system improvements including capacity building and workforce development for local service providers, investing in data systems (including HMIS) to meet reporting requirement, and improving coordinated entry systems to eliminate racial bias or to create a youth-specific CES. To receive the remainder of funding, applicants are required to include the following information in the final application due June 30, 2022: a completed narrative template, a [Local Homelessness Action Plan](#) and approved [outcome goals](#), that have been agendaized at a regular meeting of the ICH, and received public comment, before being submitted to CA ICH.
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- **Family Homelessness Challenge Grant** – Cal ICH released the [Request for Applications \(RFA\) for the Family Homelessness Challenge \(FHC\) Grant Program](#). The FHC program provides \$40 million in competitive grants and technical assistance to local communities to promote rapid innovation, accelerate nascent programs, and expand promising practices to create scalable solutions that can be shared across the state to address and ultimately end family homelessness. Cal ICH will fund innovative applications from local jurisdictions (cities & counties) and Continuums of Care (CoCs) that accelerate efforts to address and end family homelessness by making families' experiences of homelessness rare, brief, and one-time. Applications are due by April 30th.
- **State Announces Two Programs for Current or Future California Homeowners** – The state of California announced two programs to help Californians become homeowners or to remain homeowners – a program to provide forgivable loans to homebuyers for up to ten percent of the purchase price, and the approval more than \$67 million in grant funding for 33 **CalHome Program** projects located across California – projects that will ultimately support low- and very low-income households so they can become or remain homeowners. **Forgivable Equity Builder Loan**, which helps homebuyers with a loan of up to 10 percent of the purchase price, which is forgivable after five years in the home, making homeownership more attainable for Californians.
- **Homeless Innovative Programs Grant** – The California Department of Education's (CDE) Integrated Student Support and Programs Office announced the release of the Homeless Innovative Programs Grant [Request for Application](#) (RFA). The CDE is accepting applications from school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools, to implement a Homeless Innovative Programs grant, aligned with the provisions of the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act to improve the educational stability, access, support, and academic achievement of children and youth experiencing homelessness. Grantees will receive up to \$450,000 total for the two-year grant period. For any questions, please email HERFA@cde.ca.gov
- **Homekey funding** – The City of Redlands was awarded \$30 million in Homekey Funding for a motel conversion to create 99 units of affordable permanent housing. To date, CA HCD has awarded over \$832 million (out of \$1.45 billion) for 49 projects to create 2,963 housing units with Homekey Round 2 funding. Completed applications will be accepted on a rolling basis until funds are exhausted or May 2, 2022, whichever comes first. [Front page | Homekey \(ca.gov\)](#).

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Maximizing the Roles and Responsibilities of California's Continuums of Care (CoCs)

- Forging an unprecedented partnership between CoCs and State government, counties, cities, and community stakeholders is timely
- [Recently approved and proposed legislation and budgeted funding](#) provides State government with an opportunity to weave together an unprecedented homelessness strategy that builds upon existing actions and plans
- Maximizing the extensive and influential roles and responsibilities of CoCs would further their current supportive actions and create new supportive opportunities to include in an unparalleled statewide homelessness strategy

The extensive and influential roles and responsibilities of California's CoCs support several current actions taken by the State to solve statewide and local homelessness that involve 1) local Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS); 2) State's Homeless Data Integration System (HDIS); 3) Coordinated Entry Systems (CES); and 4) annual homeless counts.

Unprecedented dialogue should occur between State government and CoC leaders to shape and implement an unparalleled homelessness strategy. Various state agencies, departments, and councils have encouraged dialogue with CoCs. However, the ICH has been tasked with implementing a unique dialogue between State government and CoC leaders.


KEY FINDINGS

1. Although California has more than doubled production of new affordable homes in the past 3 years, the State is only funding 16% of what it needs to meet its goals.
2. Renters need to earn 2.8 times the state minimum wage to afford average asking rent in California, which increased by 11% since last year.
3. Half of California's 6 million renter households are lower income, with more than 1 million extremely low-income renter households.
4. Only 10% of renter resources from the State are permanent/ongoing compared to 99% of the support for homeowners.

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



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Statewide Housing Plan Envisions Safe and Stable Housing for all Californians

The California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) recently released the [California Statewide Housing Plan](#), which describes the vision to ensure every Californian has a safe, stable, and affordable home. After decades of underproduction coupled with exclusionary policies, California’s housing supply is drastically behind need while housing costs continue to soar.

These effects are deeply felt by renters and owners across the state who are burdened by high costs leading to one-third of Californians being unable to afford their home. Black, Indigenous and People of Color, immigrants, young people, elderly, low-income households, families with children and people with disabilities are disproportionately impacted by housing unaffordability -- requiring individuals and families to make choices between paying for housing, food, health care, childcare, and transportation.

The Statewide Housing Plan describes the immediate need for action, identifies steps the state and local governments are currently taking to address California’s housing problem, and provides short-term and long-term strategies to address these problems:

Per the Statewide Housing Plan, the state will work towards the following objectives over the next 10 years:

- (1) **Keep Californians in their Homes**; by preserving existing affordable housing with financial support to residents, anti-eviction measures, and affordable housing preservation laws to protect renters.
- (2) **Produce More Affordable and Climate-Smart Housing**; by increasing supply of housing at all affordability levels throughout the state and target production in most needed places without displacing existing residents and producing housing that is climate resilient with sustainable building strategies.
- (3) **Continue to Act with Urgency to Address Homelessness and Housing Need**; by connecting people with affordable housing and services faster, eliminating barriers that cause delays in affordable housing funding allocations or housing construction, strengthen commitments of partners, and increase breadth of stakeholders to eradicate homelessness.
